KARATINA UNIVERSITY HOSTS 13TH ANNU-AL CAREER WEEK: BRIDGING THE GAP BE-TWEEN EDUCATION, INDUSTRY, AND CA-REER EXCELLENCE

This event held annually was organized by the Directorate of Career Services, University Industry Linkages and Alumni Services. The aim of this is to provide insights and mentorship and guidance in career opportunities. It brought together secondary school students, university students, staff, and industry partners to offer career guidance and mentorship. The first day saw a strong turnout, with students from ten high schools including Mathaithi Girls High School, Kanjuri Boys, Giakaibei Secondary, General China High School among others.

The event was officially launched by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor Academic, Research, and Student Affairs on behalf of the Vice Chancellor. EMPOWERING YOUNG GIRLS: WAFW AND G.E.M.S VISIT IHWAGI SECONDARY SCHOOL

On March 6, 2025, the World Academy for the Future of Women (WAFW), in collaboration with the Girls Empowerment, Mentoring, and Sanitization (G.E.M.S) project, conducted a transformative visit to Ihwagi Secondary School. The initiative aimed to educate and empower young girls by addressing critical issues related to reproductive health, personal hygiene, and self-esteem. The visiting team, comprising ten girls from the G.E.M.S project, was warmly welcomed by the school's Life Skills Teacher, who facilitated the session. The discussions focused on proper menstrual hygiene management, safe disposal of sanitary products, and daily hygiene practices. The team also engaged the girls in conversations on body image and peer pressure, encouraging self-confidence, self-acceptance, and resilience against negative influences.

The visit was a resounding success, equipping the students with essential knowledge and resources to navigate adolescence with confidence and dignity. The initiative reflects the commitment of WAFW and G.E.M.S to empowering young girls, with plans to extend similar programs to more schools.
