Welcome to *The 13th Issue of Karatina University Chronicle t*hat demonstrates a year of dynamic progress, setting a strong foundation for excellence.

Karatina University has witnessed significant growth and achievements across multiple domains, reinforcing its commitment to academic excellence, institutional development and community engagement.

Institutional Capacity and Leadership

The University strengthened its leadership structure through several high-profile appointments. Prof. Isaac Muthure Macharia was appointed the 2nd Chancellor of Karatina University for a five-year term, effective April 11, 2025. Prof. Macharia is an accomplished ENT surgeon, Associate Professor at the University of Nairobi, and holds significant executive roles, including Non-Executive Chairman of Equity Group Holdings Plc.

New council members' appointments effective July 25, 2025, include appointment of CPA, David Joseph Osero Nyakang'o (finance/audit expert) and Dr. Edward N. Kobuthi (seasoned executive/board leader). Mr. Abdul Malik Aman, an Environmental Economist, is serving as the representative of the Principal Secretary of The National Treasury.

The University also made key senior management appointments. Prof. Franklin Wabwoba, a pioneering scholar and Kenya's first Full Professor of Information Technology, was appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor

(Academic, Research and Student Affairs), effective January 1, 2025. Prof. Richard M. Kiai, a Certified Public Accountant and Associate Professor of Finance, was appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Planning, Finance and Administration), effective June 3, 2025.

Karatina University further enhanced its academic strength, boasting 118 PhD holders, with 64.97% of academic staff holding doctoral qualifications. A strategic recruitment drive led to new appointments, significantly strengthening the Schools of Health Sciences, Computing, and Informatics Staff productivity was also enhanced through training initiatives, including a partnership with the National Productivity and Competitiveness Centre (NPCC).

Infrastructure and Expansion

The University is undertaking major capital investments to support its growing population and enhance service delivery. A new academic unit, School of Computing & Informatics, was established to independently manage and advance comprehensive programs in computing, cyber security, data science, and AI, responding directly to high student and industry demand for digital skills.

The Construction of a Student Centre valued at (Ksh 100 million) is at an advanced stage. The modern, multipurpose unit is designed to be the heart of student life, featuring among others a spacious central courtyard, gym, sauna, and catering facilities.



The Upcoming iHub

To accommodate the increasing student population, an additional academic block worth KSh 500 million is under construction. The facility will provide six laboratories and fifty lecture rooms, offering improved learning environments and specialized training spaces.

Additionally, a six-storey building, also valued at KSh 500 million, is under construction at Karatina Town to house the School of Health Sciences, strategically positioning it for enhanced community engagement and delivery of essential medical services to the residents.

These three projects are scheduled for handover between January and June 2026. The University has adopted a full financing model at the commencement stage to ensure timely project completion and maximum value for money.

Additionally, construction of a six-storey ICT and Computing Complex (dubbed "iHub"), estimated at KSh 500 million, is set to commence by the end of 2025. Our journey to solarize the university has begun with earnest, starting with a 80KW project scheduled for hand over by end of October 2025.

The University's transport capacity was also enhanced with the acquisition of a new Isuzu semi-luxury large bus, with another expected to be delivered soon.

Academic Milestones and Oversight

The 13th Graduation Ceremony celebrates the highest number of graduands at 1800 graduates. Additionally, a record has been achieved with the completion of eight

(8) postgraduate students within the expected timeframe, demonstrating the university's commitment to academic excellence and timely program delivery.

The 2025/2026 first-year cohort was officially welcomed on 1st September 2025, recording an impressive 96% reporting rate and a total enrolment of 4,626 first year students. Their orientation week culminated in the Vice-Chancellor's Address, during which he weaved his message and urging them to "protect their mental garden," with an emphasis on the philosophy of Discipline, Practice, and Persistence (DPP) as key pillars for personal and academic success.

In March 2025, the Commission for University Education (CUE) conducted its regular, rigorous five-year institutional audit to assess compliance with national standards and quality benchmarks, subsequently granting the University a strong stamp of approval for its continued adherence to excellence.

Research Capacity and Partnerships

Karatina University partnered with the Max Planck Institute (Germany) to host a transformative seven-day workshop aimed at equipping postgraduate students with essential research skills.

A new partnership with the FAO-UN E-Learning Academy is now in place, granting students access to over 200 certified short courses, thereby enhancing their global exposure and professional development.

Staff capacity was further strengthened through Grant Writing Workshops, which focused on securing external funding, and specialized NACOSTI training designed to empower the Ethics Review Committee (ERC) and uphold high ethical standards in research. Our journey with KENIA has just begun, with the future towards innovation and commercialization looking bright.

The University also hosted a Workshop on the Commercialization of Research Outputs in collaboration with KIPI, during which plans were announced to establish a dedicated Technology Transfer Office to support innovation and intellectual property management.

Culminating these research and innovation efforts, Karatina University successfully hosted the International Conference on Sustainable Knowledge Systems (ICSKS 2025) under the theme "AI for a Sustainable Future," bringing together global scholars, researchers, and policymakers to explore the transformative potential of artificial intelligence in advancing sustainable development.

Industry and Technology Focus

The institution, tracing its origins to a tea training centre, celebrated a century of Kenyan tea by launching a specialized tea curriculum, including a Post-Graduate Diploma in Tea Science and Management, and hosted executive training for 33 professionals from 18 leading tea companies. The first training session had 33 participants, and the second one had a total of 66 participants.

The University hosted a landmark 'Train the Trainer' workshop in collaboration with Marketplace Simulations, Knoxville, Tennessee USA, utilizing virtual business environments to promote practical, experience-based learning. The university also joined the ACCESS 2.0 Project (2025–2029) project is implemented in collaboration with the University of Leipzig (Germany). Through these Karatina University will enhance entrepreneurship education and embed service-learning into academic programs to better prepare students for the world of work and impactful community engagement.

Community Outreach Initiatives

The University carried out several high-impact community service activities, including free medical camps, empowerment of church leaders, administration at different levels with Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) skills in collaboration with the Judiciary. A three-year Mathematics Locus Mentorship Programme was

launched to inspire high school students and build confidence in mathematics. Furthermore, the university conducted capacity-building workshops for both school principals, and guidance and counseling teachers to enhance leadership and student support systems in the region.

Student Welfare and Leadership

Notably, student leader and Vice-Chairperson Vivian Kinya achieved international recognition by being elected as the International Youth Representative for the Duke of Edinburgh Award where she will be representing Kenya and Africa. She is also an awardee of Kenya's Presidential Award Scheme.

Karatina University hosted multiple workshops in partnership with NACADA to empower youth in drug prevention. This initiative led to the establishment of the Substance crisis and Response Centre, marking a proactive step towards addressing substance use among the youth.

The university also made history by holding the first All-Women Leadership Academy Graduation in Africa for the inaugural cohort of the World Academy for the Future of Women. Building on this milestone, the second WAFW cohort and the inaugural Men's Academy were launched this year, further advancing the University's commitment to gender-inclusive leadership development

A major forum was held with local landlords and the university management to strengthen collaboration on student safety and welfare in off campus housing. The engagement resulted in resolutions to enhance security and streamline dispute resolution mechanisms.

Karatina University further celebrated a year of outstanding sporting achievements, dominating the KUSA Central League where the Handball Women's and Football Men's teams emerged as overall champions in their respective categories, finishing as overall champions in their respective events. The university also launched Students Inaugural Cultural Week as a vibrant celebration of diversity and unity.

In conclusion, Karatina University has made and continues to make remarkable strides in leadership, infrastructure development, academic excellence, research, and community impact. Through strategic engagements and partnerships, a strong student-centered approach, the university remains well-positioned for sustained growth and meaningful contribution to national and global development goals.



INFRASTRUCTURE

STUDENT CENTRE



In a major boost for student welfare and extracurricular activities, Karatina University is at advanced level in construction of a modern, multi-purpose Student Centre at a cost of one hundred million shillings.

The project is designed to address a critical shortage of recreational and social facilities.

The university's rapidly growing student population has outpaced the development of supporting infrastructure. The institution relies on a limited number of sports pitches and a private businesses enterprise operating within the campus to serve student needs.

The new circular-designed centre, covering 2,500 square metres, aims to become the heart of student life at the main campus. It will feature a large central courtyard with a skylight roof, designed to host a variety of events and large gatherings for student bodies like the Christian

Union (CU) among other Christian Students Association (CSA) and student led Societies.

Beyond the main hall, the facility will house a diverse range of amenities including a gym, a sauna, a catering facility, and several small shops. It will also provide office space for the Dean of Students and student leaders, consolidating student services under one roof.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Linus M. Gitonga, has put all mitigation strategies in place to keep the project on its strict 11-month schedule. This include appointment of an internal Project Implementation Committee (PIC) alongside the consultants to monitor progress through monthly site meetings.

This development is aligned with the university's strategic plan and the national government's Vision 2030 goal of enhancing lifelong learning and innovation opportunities for Kenyan citizens.

DEVELOPMENTS

CONSTRUCTION OF SCHOOL OF HEALTH SCIENCES AT KARATINA TOWN



In a major move to expand its facilities and enhance community outreach, the University is setting up a School of Health Sciences at Karatina Town, a project that will cost Ksh 500 million. This new building is not just about creating space for the rise in number of students; it's also about strategically relocating a critical school to serve the community better.

The new six-storey building, complete with a basement parking lot, will house modern lecture rooms, specialized laboratories, and offices. Its location in the heart of Karatina Town is deliberate. The university aims to reestablish its presence in the town - following the relocation of the School of Business from a leased facility- and

provide essential medical services to local residents and users of the busy Nairobi-Nanyuki highway.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Linus Gitonga has given the works three-year timeline to be completed by November 2027. Once completed, the new School of Health Sciences is expected to be a landmark project, alleviating pressure on the main campus and positioning Karatina University as a key provider of healthcare education and services in the region. The project as well, aligns with the government's Vision 2030 goals of promoting lifelong learning and innovation. It also fulfills the university's philosophy of integrating knowledge with community outreach.

VC Charts Ambitious Course for School of Health Sciences

In a dynamic and forward-looking meeting, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Linus M. Gitonga, laid out a strategic vision for the School of Health Sciences, emphasizing that its growth is pivotal to the institution's future. The interactive session, held on 1st October, 2025, provided a crucial platform for faculty and staff to

directly engage with the University's leadership. The meeting was focused on charting a clear way forward, sharing innovative ideas for expansion, and exploring new opportunities for improvement. A central part of the discussions involved a candid address of the current challenges facing the school. Prof. Gitonga listened attentively to the concerns raised, fostering

an environment of open dialogue and collective problem-solving.

In his address, the Vice Chancellor identified three core principles as the non-negotiable drivers for success: collaboration, innovation, and a shared commitment to excellence.

"The role of the School of Health Sciences in training the next generation of healthcare professionals has never been more critical," stated Prof. Gitonga. "By strengthening our internal partnerships and embracing innovative teaching and research methods, we can ensure that our graduates are not only competent but are leaders in their field."

The meeting was widely regarded as a significant step towards reinforcing the academic and operational framework of the school. Attendees expressed optimism about the collaborative path outlined by the VC, noting that such engagement is essential for tangible progress.

This initiative is seen as a key component of the broader university-wide mission, underscoring a shared resolve to continue building a stronger and more impactful Karatina University for years to come.

CONSTRUCTION OF TUITION AND LABORATORY BLOCK



In a major move to accommodate the rapidly growing student population, Karatina University is constructing an additional tuition and laboratory block at an estimated cost of Kshs. 500 million, which is a significant investment in the University infrastructure. The four/five-storey building is designed to house a mix of modern facilities, including six laboratories capable of holding 70-100 students, forty mid-sized lecture rooms, and ten large lecture theatres for 201-260 students. The project aims to "eliminate"

congestion and provide "custom-made lecture rooms" to enhance the quality of teaching and learning.

The University Vice-Chancellor, has planned for completion of the project as at December 2026. The project aligns with the university's strategic plan and the national government's Vision 2030 goal of promoting quality education, innovation, and lifelong learning. Once completed, the new block is expected to significantly decongest the main campus and future-proof the institution against its steadily growing student intake.

ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL OF COMPUTING & INFORMATICS

In a strategic move to address the rapidly evolving technological landscape, Karatina University has officially announced the establishment of the School of Computing & Informatics. This new academic unit will independently manage and advance a comprehensive suite of programs designed to produce skilled professionals for the digital age.

The newly formed school consolidates the university's robust computing disciplines into two focused departments:

- The Department of Computer Science: This department will host undergraduate and postgraduate programs, including BSc. Computer Science, BSc. and MSc. Cyber Security and Digital Forensics, and Data Science annot Artificial Intelligence.
- The Department of Information Systems and Technology: This department will oversee a range of IT and information-focused programs, including BSc. Information Technology, BSc. Information Science, BSc. Knowledge Management, as well as PhD and MSc. degrees in Information Technology and Information Science.

The University is responding to a multiple compelling market needs including:

Growth and Industry Needs

A primary driver is the remarkable surge in student interest. This establishment is a direct response to the rising demand for computing education and the growing need for expertise in cutting-edge fields. The global and local job market is hungry for skilled professionals in areas like AI and cybersecurity, and the school aligns perfectly with national goals for technological advancement.

A Hub for Innovation and Collaboration

The School of Computing & Informatics is positioned to be more than just an academic unit; it is envisioned as a hub for innovation and industry partnership. The school will facilitate short-term, industry-aligned professional courses to support continuous skill development. This initiative is already underway, building on an existing Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with global tech giant Huawei and ongoing staff training for the establishment of a Cisco academy.

Furthermore, the dedicated school structure is expected to significantly enhance research and innovation. It will promote focused research in high-impact areas such as machine learning, digital systems, and software engineering, thereby strengthening opportunities for research funding and partnerships with technology companies and innovation hubs.

Investment in Infrastructure and Faculty

To support its ambitious mandate, the school will drive the development of specialized, state-of-the-art laboratories. Planned facilities include dedicated labs for Robotics, Networking and Cybersecurity, Al and Machine Learning, Data Science and Big Data, and Digital Forensics and Ethical Hacking. This focused approach ensures efficient resource allocation and provides students with hands-on experience using industry-standard tools.

The launch of the School of Computing and Informatics at Karatina University marks a pivotal step in cementing the institution's role as a leading contributor to Kenya's and the region's digital future.

Karatina University Charts Digital Future as VC Engages Computing Faculty

On 1st October, 2025, In a noteworthy move to augment the University technological edge, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Linus M. Gitonga, held a comprehensive dialogue with the Faculty of Computer Science and Informatics, focusing on the faculty's pivotal role in the institution's strategic vision.

The interactive session, which brought together academic staff, served as a forward-looking forum to align the faculty's growth with the university's long-term ambitions.

Professor Gitonga underscored the critical need for "future-fit solutions" and a stronger alignment with industry needs. He emphasized the faculty's central role in nurturing a new generation of tech talent capable of driving Kenya's ongoing digital transformation.

"This engagement is a clear indicator of the University's commitment to academic excellence and inclusive leadership," a university representative stated. "It is through such collaborative dialogues that we can truly foster institutional growth and ensure our programmes remain relevant and impactful."

The meeting is seen as a concrete step in Karatina University's continued commitment to positioning itself as a leader in technology education, directly contributing to the national agenda for a digitally skilled workforce.

UNIVERSITY TO LAUNCH STATE-OF-THE-ART "INNOVATION HUB," FORGING A NEW PATH FOR TECH AND ENTREPRENEURS



Karatina University is redefining the landscape of technology education and entrepreneurship, underway is construction of a cutting-edge ICT facility, to be known as the "Innovation Hub." The project is envisioned as a dynamic nucleus designed to fuse academic research with real-world industry collaboration and startup creation.

Slated to be more than just a building, the Innovation Hub will be a purpose-built ecosystem for creativity. Its design philosophy centers on breaking down traditional silos, fostering an environment where students, researchers, startup founders, and industry partners can collaborate under one roof.

The facility has an array of advanced features, organized into distinct yet interconnected zones:

A Smart and Flexible Foundation

The building itself will be a model of modern design, featuring an open floor plan to encourage spontaneous interaction, alongside modular workstations that can be reconfigured for hackathons or deep research. The commitment to sustainability is woven into its blueprint, with plans for rooftop solar panels, energy-efficient systems, and the use of sustainable materials.

High-Tech Powerhouse

At its core, the Hub will be powered by super-fast internet and 5G connectivity. It will house specialized labs equipped for the frontiers of technology, including an AI & Data Science Lab with GPU clusters, an AR/VR Lab for immersive development, and a 3D Printing & Prototyping Lab for rapid hardware iteration.

Nurturing the Innovation Lifecycle

The Hub is designed to support every stage of the innovation process. "Startup Pods" and an "Incubator

& Accelerator" space will provide a home for nascent companies, while a dedicated "Investor & Funding Hub" will offer private pods for teams to pitch to venture capitalists and angel investors. On-site legal and business advisory services will assist with intellectual property and company formation.

Focus on Community and Well-being

Recognizing that creativity thrives in a healthy environment, the plans include significant well-being spaces. An indoor fitness and recreation center, a wellness and meditation room, and a cafeteria focused on healthy menus are all part of the design. Community areas like "Startup Alley," a digital showcase for resident ventures, and a "Mentorship Hub" will facilitate networking and knowledge sharing.

Future-Forward and Secure

The facility will be secured with 24/7 biometric entry and an Al-powered surveillance system, while also being fully accessible with ramps, elevators, and adjustable workstations. In a forward-looking step, planners are also considering creating a digital twin of the entire Hub for real-time facility management and energy optimization.

The project extends beyond campus walls, with plans to partner with local tech clusters and government innovation agencies to source mentors and investors. The success of the Innovation Hub will be measured by key performance indicators such as startup survival rates, research publications, and successful technology transfers. Hub is poised to become a landmark destination for the next generation of innovators, signaling a major investment in the region's future as a leader in the digital economy.

Boosting Productivity with Strategic Training Initiative



In a significant move to enhance institutional efficiency and competitiveness, Karatina University, in partnership with the National Productivity and Competitiveness Centre (NPCC), successfully concluded a comprehensive three-day Productivity Mainstreaming Training Workshop.

Held at the university's Senate Chambers from May 26th to 28th, 2025 the workshop brought together academic and non-academic heads of departments, section leaders, and members of the Productivity Mainstreaming Committee. The timing of the training was strategic, coinciding with the first surveillance audit by the Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS), underscoring the institution's commitment to quality and continuous improvement.

The event was officially opened by the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Linus M. Gitonga. In his opening address, Prof. Gitonga inspired attendees by emphasizing the power of collective, consistent effort. "It is the small, consistent efforts that drive the university forward," he stated, reinforcing the core principle that "everybody counts and little things matter." He called on the entire university community to work collaboratively towards building an institution they can all be proud of.

The Acting Deputy Vice Chancellor for Planning, Prof. Richard Kiai, highlighted the critical link between clear roles, teamwork, and productivity. VC'S ADDRESS TO 2025/2026 FIRST YEARS



TEND YOUR MIND'S GARDEN: VC WELCOMES FRESHERS WITH A POWERFUL MESSAGE OF GROWTH

The 2025/2026 cohort of first-year students at Karatina University was officially welcomed into the academic community 17th September, 2025 with an inspiring address from the Vice Chancellor, Professor Linus Muthuri Gitonga, who urged them to view their minds as gardens requiring diligent cultivation.

Speaking during the welcome ceremony on Wednesday, from the Vice Chancellor congratulated the students on their significant achievement and framed their university journey around a powerful, timeless metaphor: "the mind as a garden."

"Your mind, like any fertile land, requires deliberate tending," the VC stated. "What you plant and nurture will ultimately determine your harvest. If you allow weeds—fear, procrastination, and doubt—to grow unchecked, they will choke your potential. But if you choose to sow seeds of discipline, consistency, and curiosity, your life will blossom."

THE THREE TASKS OF A MASTER GARDENER

Prof. Gitonga outlined three essential tasks for students to master:

- 1. Prepare the Soil: Students were advised to cultivate self-contentment and resist comparing themselves to others, weed out the fear of external judgment, and embrace change as a "fertilizer for growth."
- Plant the Right Seeds: The VC emphasized sowing seeds of consistency in daily effort, choosing rich experiences over material possessions, and starting immediately rather than waiting for perfect conditions.
- 3. Tend Your Plot: This involves setting strong boundaries, valuing solitude for reflection, pruning overthinking, learning from setbacks, and nourishing one's body—the "soil of the mind."

THE GUIDING SLOGAN: DPP

Central to this philosophy is the mantra of Discipline, Practice, and Persistence (DPP).

"Think of this as your guiding slogan:

'Discipline to begin, practice to improve, persistence to finish'," the Vice Chancellor said, encouraging students to let these three words become their daily affirmations. "Your journey begins in the mind, and when the mind is trained with DPP, there is truly no limit to what you can achieve."

A WARNING AGAINST COMMON PITFALLS

The address also served as a cautionary guide, highlighting seven common pitfalls that can derail a student's progress:

- Poor financial management of student loans.
- Misusing newfound freedom by confusing it with irresponsibility.
- Graduating with a blank CV, lacking leadership or extracurricular experience.
- Succumbing to the trap of procrastination.
- Keeping toxic associations that drain potential.
- Neglecting physical and mental well-being.
- Losing sight of their core purpose and long-term vision.

THE UNIVERSITY'S COMMITMENT

Reaffirming the institution's role, the VC stated that Karatina University's mission is to be a university of global excellence that prepares students to transform society.

"Our core values—Equity, Excellence, Mutual Respect, and others—are the fertile soil in which your character and intellect will grow," he said. The university promises to provide the resources, mentors, and environment for students to flourish, but emphasized that the daily work of "planting, weeding, and tending" rests with the individual.

Concluding on a note of hope and solidarity, from the Vice Chancellor reminded students that everyone is "tending to their own garden, fighting their own hidden weeds," and encouraged them to seek help from provided counselling services when needed.

"Build not just a career, but a character. Not just a CV, but a compelling story of growth," he concluded. "The stage is set. The journey begins."

CUE CONDUCTS RIGOROUS FIVE-YEAR AUDIT

The Commission for University Education (CUE) has commenced a comprehensive institutional audit of Karatina University, a mandatory exercise designed to ensure the institution's adherence to national standards and quality education benchmarks.

The four-day evaluation, which began on Monday, March 24, 2025, conducted by an eleven-member delegation of experts led by Prof. James Tuitoek. The audit team meticulously assess all facets of the university's operations, including the quality of academic programs, physical infrastructure, library services, financial management, institutional governance, and human resources.

The process, mandated to occur every five years, is a critical component of Kenya's higher education oversight. The CUE team's assessment is based on a stringent set of regulatory frameworks, including the Universities Act 2012, the revised University

Regulations of 2023, and the CUE's own Standards for University Education.

A university spokesperson stated that the institution's proactive engagement in the audit underscores its unwavering dedication to maintaining excellence in education and administration. "This reflects a commitment to continuous improvement and accountability," the statement read, highlighting the collaborative effort between the university's leadership and regulatory bodies to uphold the highest standards of quality and integrity.

COMPLIANT, GROWING, AND STUDENT-CENTERED INSTITUTION

The Commission for University Education (CUE) Institutional Quality Audit conducted from March 24th to 27th, 2025 included findings that position the University as a compliant, growing, and student-centered institution. Some of the strength highlighted included:

The University demonstrates significant strength in its robust governance and management, with a fully constituted Council, a substantively appointed Vice-Chancellor, and regular, effective operations of its Senate and University Management Board.

Academically, the institution is distinguished by its highly qualified staff, with 82% of academic staff holding PhDs, and a portfolio of 41 CUE-approved programmes aligned with both its mission and national manpower needs. The University further excels in providing comprehensive student support services, including welfare initiatives, counseling, health services, and well-maintained facilities, with a notable focus on vulnerable students.

Infrastructure is a key asset, featuring a developing ultra-modern library, well-designed

and accessible lecture rooms, and a secure, serene environment conducive to learning. The University also shows strong financial health, with an average annual surplus of Kshs. 156 million over five years.

A culture of strategic engagement is evident through active linkages with industry, a dedicated Centre for Community Outreach, impactful research, and both local and international partnerships. Overall, the University maintains high levels of satisfaction among its staff, students, alumni, and employers, who affirm the quality of education and the competitiveness of its graduates.

With the successful launch of its new curriculum and a reinforced commitment to innovation, Karatina University has positioned itself as a crucial engine for the next century of Kenyan tea.

Brewing Success with Executive Tea Training



In a significant boost to the local tea industry, Karatina University successfully undertook a specialized executive training program designed to equip professionals with advanced skills in tea production and quality assurance.

The intensive two-week course, hosted by the University's Tea Institute from June 3rd to 13th, 2025, attracted 33 participants from 18 leading companies across the Kenyan tea sector. Attendees represented a wide spectrum of the industry, including major players like Lipton Teas and Infusions, the Kenya Tea Development Agency (KTDA), Sotik Tea, Venus Tea Brokers, and several independent factories and estates.

The program was meticulously designed to bridge the gap between theory and practice. While classroom sessions covered critical topics such as global market trends, ISO and HACCP compliance, and innovations in green tea production, the learning was brought to life through hands-on practical sessions. In collaboration with neighbouring Ragati, Ndima, and Kangaita tea factories, participants were immersed in the entire tea value chain.

They gained firsthand experience in tea tasting, sensory evaluation, and processing technologies,



including the Orthodox and CTC methods. The curriculum also addressed the business end of the industry, focusing on how value addition through effective packaging, branding, and marketing can significantly boost profitability for producers.

Key insights from the training highlighted the growing global demand for specialty teas and the critical need for precision at every stage of production to meet stringent international export standards. Participants left with a renewed understanding of how quality management systems directly impact market competitiveness and income.

The overwhelming response to the course has revealed a substantial training gap within the industry. It positions Karatina University's Tea Institute as a pivotal leader in capacity-building efforts. The program's success, which also generated revenue for the university, underscores the demand and sustainability for such high-level training.

Looking ahead, the University plans to build on this momentum by organizing regular refresher courses and investing in a fully equipped, on-site "tea cottage" to further enhance its practical training capabilities, solidifying its role as a future centre of excellence for tea research and training in the region.



NACOSTI Training Bolsters Research Ethics



In a significant step towards strengthening its research governance, Karatina University's Ethics Review Committee (ERC) underwent an intensive four-day training workshop facilitated by the National Commission for Science, Technology and Innovation (NACOSTI). The training, held from June 16th to 19th, 2025, was designed to equip committee members with the expertise needed for national accreditation and to ensure all university research meets the highest ethical standards.

The workshop was officially opened by the University ERC Chairperson, Prof. Agnes Kihurani, who delivered remarks on behalf of the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Linus Gitoha. She emphasized the committee's vital role in upholding research integrity and protecting the rights and welfare of human and animal participants in scientific studies.

The comprehensive curriculum covered critical areas essential for a functional ethics committee, including the roles and responsibilities of ERC members, ethical principles for research involving humans, animals, plants, and the environment, and detailed procedures for proposal review and post-approval monitoring. The

sessions were highly interactive, featuring group work, peer learning, and discussions of real-life ethical case studies.

Speaking at the closing ceremony, the Deputy Vice Chancellor in charge of Academic, Research and Student Affairs, Prof. Franklin Wabwoba, lauded the initiative. He highlighted that a fully accredited and robust ERC would be central to the university's strategic goals, noting that "licensing all student research will enhance the University's visibility and improve its global and national rankings." He reaffirmed the University Management's full support for the ERC's accreditation process.

NACOSTI facilitators reaffirmed their commitment to supporting Karatina University through continued mentorship and guidance as the committee works towards its formal accreditation.

The training underscores Karatina University's steadfast commitment to fostering a culture of ethical research and upholding the highest standards of academic integrity, ensuring its research outputs are both impactful and responsibly conducted.



Africa's Al Champions





Renowned Global Forest Scientist Visits Karatina University to Strengthen Research Ties



Karatina University welcomed Dr. David Kenfack, the African Coordinator for the prestigious Forest Global Earth Observatory (ForestGEO), in a significant visit aimed at deepening a strategic partnership dedicated to advancing forest science and conservation.

Dr. Kenfack, who also serves as a Staff Scientist at the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute in the United States, held high-level discussions with university leadership to explore avenues for enhancing collaboration in research, capacity building, and knowledge exchange.

ForestGEO is a globally recognized network of forest research sites and scientists focused on understanding the diversity and functioning of tropical and temperate forests. Its extensive network spans 78 research sites across the globe, monitoring the growth and survival of nearly seven million trees representing about 13,000 species. The organization is at the forefront of critical research on carbon cycles, the impacts of climate change on biodiversity, and the dynamics of forest ecosystems.

The existing partnership between Karatina University and ForestGEO is formalized through an active

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). Dr. Kenfack's courtesy visit provided a timely opportunity to build on this foundation and identify new areas for mutual growth.

This forward-looking programme will feature capstone projects, self-paced online modules hosted on the university's Virtual Learning Management System (VLMS), and will leverage artificial intelligence to track student progress and outcomes.

Real-World Problem Solving for SMEs:

The University will integrate Problem-Based Service-Learning (SL) into its MBA and other programmes. Students will act as consultants for local small and medium enterprises (SMEs), using their research projects to develop practical, impactful solutions for real business challenges.

The ACCESS Business Ideas Club:

Annually, a competitive process will select the university's top two student innovators to participate in a intensive five-day entrepreneurship bootcamp. There, they will receive mentorship from industry leaders and innovation hubs, helping to refine their ideas into viable business ventures. Faculty mentors will provide dedicated support throughout the process.


In a further boost for student ventures, a partnership with 'Enrich Africa' will provide additional support and create valuable collaborative linkages between the European and African Union ecosystems.

WOMEN LEADERS





Partnership with UN Agency to Offer Global Digital Learning

FAO elearning Academy













Karatina University students are set to gain a significant international edge through a new partnership with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO-UN). The collaboration integrates the university's curriculum with the FAO's globally recognized E-learning Academy, providing students with access to over 200 certified short courses.

The initiative, coordinated by Dr. Mwangi Kinyanjui from the School of Natural Resources and Environmental Studies, seamlessly links specific university courses with relevant FAO online modules. For instance, students enrolled in GEO114 (International Migration) can choose from five specialized certificates in migration, while those in GEO312 (GIS) and GEO415 (Digital Image Processing) can undertake courses on using land cover data to monitor Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

"The students will undertake examinable short courses and get certificates upon completion." To ensure the programme is a core part of the learning process, performance, the courses will contribute to students' Continuous Assessment Tests (CATs) marks.

A key advantage of the programme is its flexibility. The courses are entirely self-paced, allowing students to learn online or download materials for offline study using their computers or mobile phones at their convenience, effectively making it a "take away assignment."

The benefits for the university are substantial. Beyond providing students with international learning experiences and access to rigorously developed quality notes, the partnership boosts the institution's global profile.

"The University will be invited to do testimonials either online or physically, and this increases international exposure for both students and the university,". Furthermore, linking the courses through the Karatina University Open, Distance, and E-Learning (ODEL) platform is expected to drive significant traffic to the university's website, enhancing its digital presence.

Dr. Kinyanjui confirmed that all necessary links for student access and certificate awards are available on the KarU ODEL platform under the respective courses. This partnership marks a significant step in Karatina University's commitment to offering innovative, globally-connected education.

The event concluded with a focused session on thesis planning, ensuring the future researchers left not only with enhanced technical expertise but also with a clear direction for their academic and professional paths.



In a landmark achievement for the university, **SGC Vice-Chairperson Vivian Kinya** has been elected as the International Youth Representative under the prestigious Duke of Edinburgh Award. Ms. Kinya emerged victorious from a pool of 300 global candidates, becoming one of only five representatives from Africa and one of just eight youth worldwide who will serve in this capacity from 2025 to 2028.

They detailed the significant risk factors and the profound bio-psychosocial effects that substance abuse can have on young lives, equipping students with the knowledge to make informed decisions.

The session took a deeply personal turn when Ms. Silvia Rodrigues, a facilitator from the World Academy for the Future of Women, shared a candid and moving personal testimony related to substance abuse. Her story of overcoming challenges served as a powerful beacon of hope and resilience, deeply resonating with the attentive audience.

More than just a seminar, the workshop was a clear call to action. It underscored Karatina University's unwavering commitment to building a compassionate and vigilant community, prioritizing the health, well-being, and positive transformation of every student.











Empowering the Next Generation of Young Women with Knowledge and Confidence

In a powerful move to bolster the confidence and well-being of young women, a collaborative outreach program visited Ihwagi Secondary School on Thursday 6th March, 2025, delivering crucial lessons on health, hygiene, and self-esteem.

The event, organized by the World Academy for the Future of Women (WAFW) and the Girls Empowerment, Mentoring, and Sanitization (G.E.M.S) project, aimed to provide students with the essential tools and knowledge to navigate adolescence with dignity.

The visiting delegation, which included ten peer mentors from the G.E.M.S project, was welcomed by the school's Life Skills Teacher. The session fostered an environment of open dialogue, focusing on critical yet often stigmatized topics. Key discussions included proper menstrual hygiene management, the safe disposal of sanitary products, and the importance of daily hygiene practices.

Moving beyond physical health, the mentors engaged the students in thoughtful conversations about combating negative peer pressure and fostering a positive body image. The core message centered on building self-acceptance, resilience, and unwavering self-confidence.

A dedicated question-and-answer segment allowed students to voice personal concerns in a supportive setting, receiving practical and empathetic guidance from the team.

To ensure the lessons had a lasting impact, each participating student received a comprehensive hygiene care package. The kits contained essential items such as sanitary





pads, deodorant, pocket tissues, toothpaste, face towels, and lotions, providing tangible support for their daily needs.

School officials praised the initiative, noting its significance in breaking down barriers and equipping young girls with vital resources. The resounding success of the visit at Ihwagi Secondary School marks a promising start, with WAFW and GEMS announcing plans to extend this empowering program to more schools in the region, committed to building a brighter, more confident future for all young women.

First All-Women Leadership Academy Graduation



Karatina University etched its name in the annals of leadership development on 1st July 2025 as it celebrated the landmark graduation of the inaugural cohort of the World Academy for the Future of Women (WAFW). The ceremony marked not only a first for the University but also the very first WAFW graduation in Kenya and across Africa.

The event, held at the university's library grounds, was a confluence of joy, pride, and transformative stories. It brought together key partners including the Kenya Commercial Bank (KCB) Foundation, the Africa Leadership Transformation Foundation, international WAFW facilitators, and proud parents.

The journey to this historic moment was traced back by Prof. Kellen Kiambati, Director of Resource Mobilization and WAFW team leader, to a "simple WhatsApp message during the COVID-19 pandemic." Highlighting the program's rapid growth and profound impact, Prof. Kiambati announced a significant evolution: future cohorts will be inclusive of both genders. She also revealed plans for a major summit following the graduation of the third cohort.

The graduation of these 43 young women signifies a transformational moment for Karatina University and a bold step forward in empowering a new generation of ethical, skilled, and confident leaders ready to shape the future of Africa.

Landlords Forge Pact for Student Welfare



In a significant move to address the challenges of a growing off-campus student population, Karatina University on 1st July 2025 convened a major stakeholders' forum with local landlords and hostel owners. The meeting, held on campus, aimed to strengthen partnerships focused on the safety, welfare, and holistic development of the over 10,000 students who reside in the community.

The forum brought together university management, led by Vice Chancellor Prof. Linus M. Gitonga, student leaders, and local landlords for a candid dialogue on shared responsibilities.

In his opening address, Prof. Gitonga highlighted the rapid increase in student numbers and the pressing need for more investment in quality student housing. "This place is yours—you own it," he told the assembled landlords. "Let's walk together to build a supportive environment for our students. We must prepare for the future and treat every student as we would our own child."

Echoing this sentiment, Deputy Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs, Prof. Franklin Wabwoba, commended the landlords for their support. He encouraged year-round tenancy agreements for mutual benefit and urged compassion towards students facing financial or emotional difficulties. Prof. Wabwoba also stressed the importance of early reporting of concerning behaviors such as drug abuse or mental health struggles.

The meeting yielded several key resolutions, with a strong emphasis on safety and structured support. Landlords were encouraged to equip their properties with basic firefighting equipment, ensure professional electrical wiring, and consider property insurance. There were also calls to improve street lighting and establish a local police post to enhance security.

To improve conflict resolution, the forum emphasized the need for respectful and lawful processes for handling rent arrears and safeguarding students' property during breaks. Proposals were made for a dedicated university emergency hotline and a formal grievance mechanism for landlords.

Further plans include establishing a physical office at the university to facilitate ongoing engagement with landlords and providing orientation on official hostel registration processes. The need for mental health sensitization days and better systems for tracking student movement in and out of hostels was also acknowledged.

Local leaders, including area chiefs and village elders, added their voices, encouraging landlords to take a proactive role in guiding the youth on sensitive issues like drug use and suicide.

In his closing remarks, VC Prof. Gitonga promised to lobby the County Government for enhanced support, including a police patrol vehicle, social workers, and collaborative town infrastructure development. "Let us continue walking together," he stated passionately. "I told you we will build this University until people are shaken. God willing, that day is coming. Let's build for our children."

The meeting marks a pivotal step in transforming Karatina into a safer, more supportive university town, built on a foundation of collaboration between the institution and the community it calls home.

NACADA EMPOWER YOUTH IN DRUG PREVENTION

Karatina University and NACADA Empower Youth in Landmark Drug Prevention Workshop

In a significant move to combat substance abuse among young people, Karatina University, in partnership with the National Authority for the Campaign Against Alcohol and Drug Abuse (NACADA), successfully hosted a three-day intensive workshop focused on engaging youth in drug use prevention.

The event, held at the university's main campus under the theme "Engaging Youth in Drug Use Prevention,"



brought together students, staff, and NACADA officials for a series of powerful discussions, training sessions, and collaborative action planning.

Officially opening the workshop, Deputy Vice-Chancellor Professor Franklin Wabwoba commended NACADA for selecting the university as a strategic partner. He urged students to be cautious and resist negative peer pressure, stating, "Just because everyone is doing it, you don't have to do it." He reaffirmed the university's commitment to fostering a safe, supportive, and drug-free environment for students to thrive.





The workshop curriculum was comprehensive and interactive, designed to equip students with practical skills. Key areas covered included: The pivotal role of youth as change agents in reducing drug demand; Peer-to-peer mentorship and leadership in prevention initiatives; Identifying early warning signs of substance abuse and strategies for intervention; Building essential life skills like resilience, critical decision-making, and positive influence; and Developing actionable plans for student-led anti-drug activities on campus and in surrounding communities.

Sessions were highly participatory, featuring experience sharing, group discussions, and role-playing exercises. NACADA representatives emphasized the urgent need to meaningfully involve youth in national anti-drug strategies, noting that prevention is far more sustainable and cost-effective than rehabilitation.

The workshop concluded with a powerful call to action for every participant to become a champion of drug prevention, extending their influence beyond the university to their families, neighborhoods, and future workplaces.

The event underscores Karatina University's ongoing mission to inspire innovation and leadership for sustainable development by producing innovative, responsible, and visionary graduates.

Student Empower

Dedicated to the Holistic Development of Our Student Body

The academic year has been a landmark period for student wellness at the university, with the Counseling Section and its dedicated team of Peer Counselors spearheading a diverse array of initiatives aimed at promoting mental, emotional, and physical well-being across the campus community.

The commitment to student care was evident in a packed calendar of events, ranging from large-scale advocacy campaigns to intimate support groups and professional development workshops.

Taking a Stand: Advocacy and Awareness

The university community came together in a powerful display of solidarity to mark the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence. On November 29th, the Counseling Section and Peer Counselors organized a symbolic walk across campus, raising awareness and championing a culture of respect and safety for all students.

Further strengthening the support network, a sensitization workshop on Healthy Relationships and Family Planning was held on February 11th, providing students with essential knowledge for building positive interpersonal connections.

Combating one of the most pressing issues facing youth, the university partnered with the National Authority for the Campaign Against Alcohol and Drug Abuse (NACADA) and the Substance Use Crisis Response Centre (SUCRE) to host a crucial Drug Use Prevention training from May 7th to 9th. This initiative was complemented by a seminar on the same topic at the Presbyterian University of East Africa (PUEA) on February 8th, which included empowering young leaders to drive change in their communities.

Building a Resilient Community

Recognizing the importance of mental health, the university hosted a monumental Mental Health and Emotional Well-Being Forum on April 10th, in collaboration with the Kenya Red Cross Society, Nyeri Chapter. The event, held at the University Runda Grounds, attracted an impressive 800 students who engaged in wellness activities and talks designed to destigmatize mental health issues and provide coping strategies.

The university's commitment extends to specific student groups, as seen on April 1st when the Counseling Section met with 110 student mothers to offer tailored psychosocial support and life skills empowerment, acknowledging and addressing their unique challenges.

Investing in Student Leaders, The Peer Counselors

The backbone of the university's wellness outreach, the Peer Counselors, received continuous training and support. Forty new peer counselors underwent essential training on February 2nd, 9th, and 16th, equipping them for their critical roles in client referral and mobilization.




